Indonesia has a lot of islands (more than 37 thousand) and the name itself is derived from Greek and Latin words for islands. Yes, the place has so many islands it took two different words to encompass it. While coffee isn't cultivated commercially on very many of them, a few do stand out, notably Sumatra, Sulawesi and Java.

Sumatra Mandheling Grade 1

The word Mandheling refers to a traditional ethnic group (also spelled Mandailing) in northern Sumatra, and the name has come to represent the better Arabica coffee from the island. We see a lot of Sumatran coffee labeled Gayo, which means mountain – a good sign.

Our Sumatra comes from the two best regions: the mountains around Lake Tawar in the Aceh region of northern Sumatra, and the Lintong area around Lake Toba.

We like classic Sumatra: rich and earthy with deep, syrupy body and herbal notes. Darker roasting brings out bittersweet chocolate and a touch of tobacco.

We offer both a Certified Organic and a Fair Trade Organic version. As with our conventional Sumatra, the coffee comes from the two best regions: the mountains around Lake Tawar in the Aceh region of northern Sumatra, and the Lintong area around Lake Toba.
